Today's Gospel

As we approach November' election, the words of Jesus reminds us we have responsibilities to government as well as religious duties.

This is especially true in a democracy where we have a right denied to many in our world - the right to vote and to choose our government.

The current events in Hong Kong shows the anguish when such voting rights are denied.
